3.4. Flowchart of Methodology

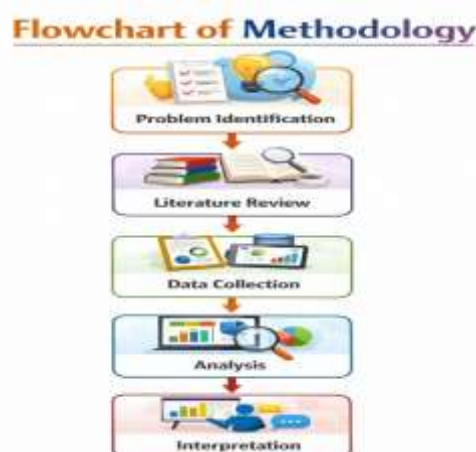


Fig 2 - Flowchart of Methodology

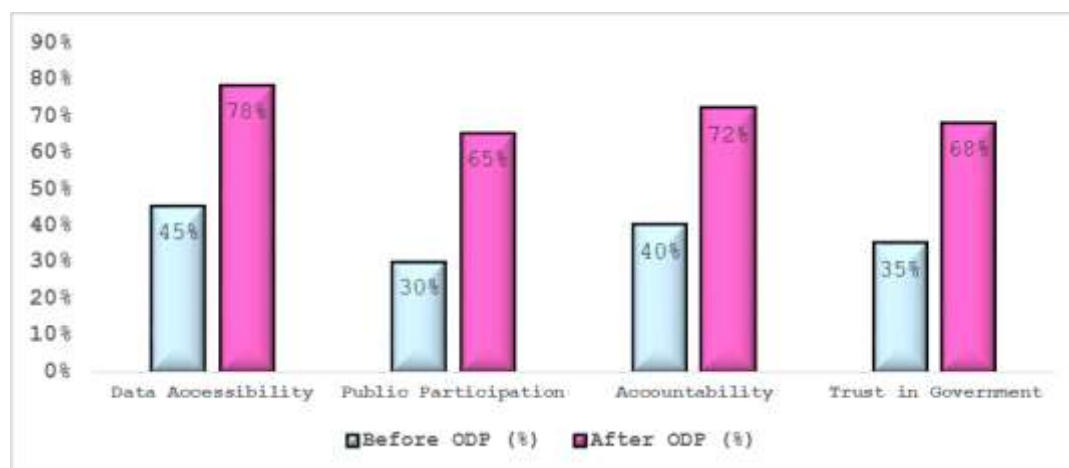


Fig 3 - Transparency Improvement Metrics
