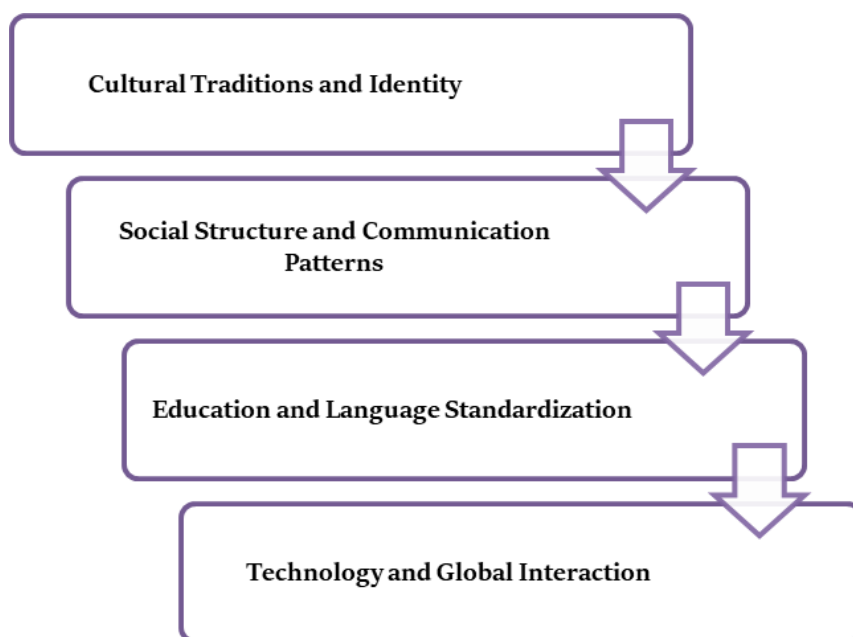


Fig 1 - Importance of Sociocultural Influences

3.2. Data Collection

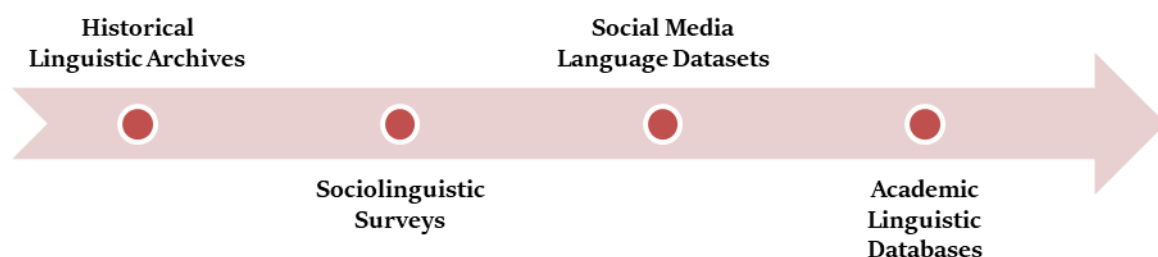


Fig 2 - Data Collection

3.4. Research Methodology Flowchart

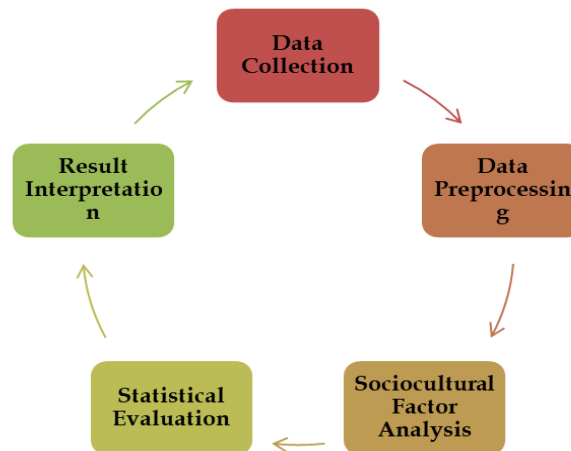


Fig 3 - Research Methodology Flowchart

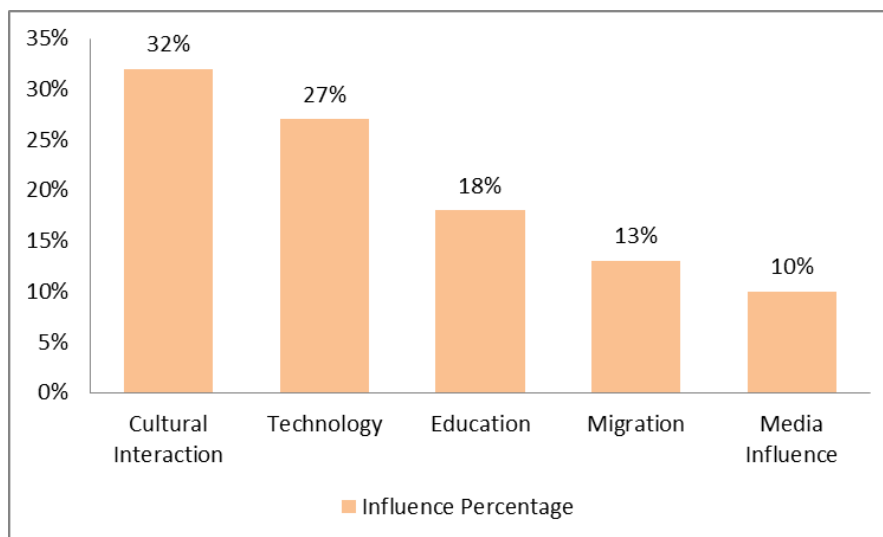


Fig 3 - Sociocultural Impact on Language Evolution
