3.4. Data Analysis Procedure

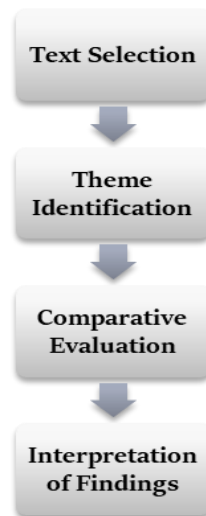


Fig 2 - Interpretation of Findings

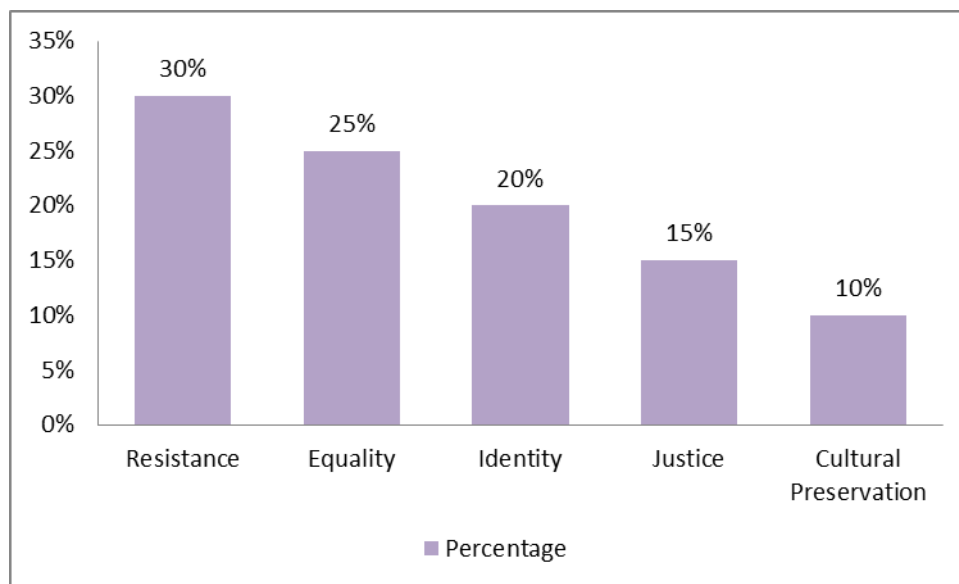


Fig 3 - Percentage Distribution of Themes
