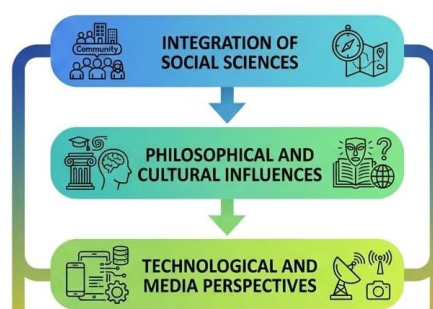


Fig 1 - Emergence of Interdisciplinary Perspectives

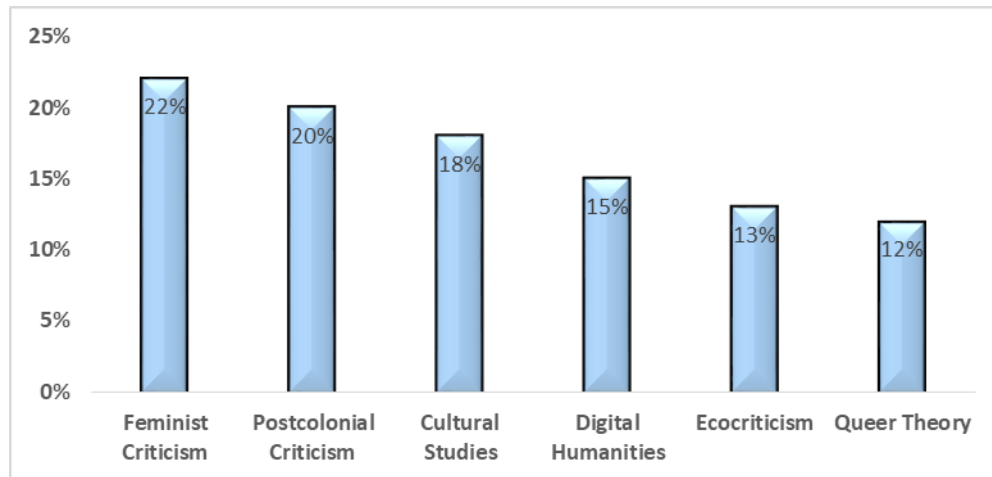


Fig 2 - Statistical Distribution of Critical Approaches
